## In the Babies Room...

With a few warmer days the Morepork tamariki have been enjoying the ball pit outside, working on their fine and gross motor control and coordination. The older toddlers in the room have been practicing their kicking, throwing and catching skills.

As a team, the Morepork teachers have been documenting and supporting schematic learning. *Schemas are patterns of linked behaviours, which the child can generalise and use in a whole variety of different situations. It is best to think of schemas as being a cluster of pieces which fit together'* (Bruce ,1997).



The Morepork teachers have noticed that many of the toddlers in the Morepork room have had a desire to collect and transport resources. They look forward to supporting and following this interest more closely throughout the month.

#### **Transporting schema**

Children enjoy repeatedly moving resources, and themselves, from one place to another. Being physically active outdoors and using wheelbarrows to move sand and other objects may support this behaviour, along with prams, cars, bags and other 'carrier' tools.







# In the Preschool Room...

Over the past month the preschool children have been engaged in focussed experiences aimed at deepening their understanding of mathematical concepts. Key concepts we have explored have been shape, size , seriation (ordering by size) and as an extension, patterning and classifying.

These mathematical concepts were highlighted and integrated across many of our curriculum areas on offer; from measuring and ordering pieces of wood at our carpentry table to cutting coloured shapes and sorting them at the art table. Baking and cutting out different shaped biscuits was a popular activity with our younger children. Making patterns with buttons, jewels and other bits and pieces has been an ongoing popular activity too.
